More About Charles Tolliver

Charles Tolliver began his career and recording debut on Blue Note Records in 1964 with the saxophonist Jackie McLean. His success grew as he became one of the all-time preeminent trumpeters in Jazz and a gifted composer/arranger of bandleaders. His Blue Note Records recording "With Love" earned him a Grammy nomination and through his five decade career, he's performed with renowned artists such as Roy Haynes, Hank Mobley, Horace Silver, Gerald Wilson Orchestra, and Stanley Cowell. In addition, Tolliver owned the trumpet chair with Max Roach for many years.
